FROM REJECTION TO REDEMPTION IN THE CHURCH



In 2019 the United Methodist Church was in crisis, with a high-profile split over the issue of homosexuality that threatened to permanently sever the 200-year-old denomination. At its annual conference, conservatives from the southern U.S., Africa, and elsewhere passed a policy that essentially ostracized LGBT people and clergy, proclaiming that "the practice of homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching." Thanks to the work of fierce

LGBT advocacy and protests many of the conservative denominations formed their own sect. The mainline church worked through its issues without a messy split and in November it ordained their first Black gay bishop **Rev. Cederic Bridgeforth**. He won the appointment after the UMC Western Jurisdiction voted for him with nearly 80 percent of the vote. Following his election, Bridgeforth thanked his husband for his love and was met with applause from the crowd.

Bishop Bridgeforth was recently in Palm Springs and discussed his remarkable journey to a leadership position in the church, much of it brilliantly described in his recent autobiography "Alabama Grandson, A Black Gay Minister's Passage Out of Hiding." Through his writing, lectures, and witness, he is a powerful advocate for racial and sexual identity within the changing Methodist Church worldwide. HELPING STUDENTS CONNECT WITH THEIR HERITAGE 2023 HBCU TOUR

Young people growing up in Palm Springs often don't have positive role models of black excellence to equip them to be successful in a country that often undervalues and stereotypes them. Our speaker at our membership meeting on February 10 is **Jarvis Williams**, the Diversity and Racial Equity Specialist for the Palm Springs Unified School District. He is working hard to create programs that reverse that narrative through the Junior Black Achievers, African American Parent Advisory Council, an annual systemwide Diversity conference, multicultural festivals, and an effort that will send two dozen Black high school students on a tour of Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and an additional two dozen local Latino high school students to Hispanic Serving Institutions in Texas. Last year the program sent 22 students and their chaperones on an HBCU tour that visited the East Coast institutions of Howard, Hampton, Norfolk, and Morgan State as well as monuments, museums, and historic locations. Mr. Williams will help BOD understand how we can help young people in our community connect with African American culture and support

RIVERSIDE ELECTS BLACK GAY STATE ASSEMBLY MEMBER

When Riverside County voters elected **Dr. Corey Jackson** to the California State Assembly in November, he became the first Black and openly LGBTQ California State Legislator in the State's history. The former community activist represents a new district that represents a large portion of Riverside County, including Moreno Valley, Perris, Hemet, San Jacinto, and the unincorporated areas of Mead Valley, Good Hope, Nuevo, and East Hemet. He won the seat with a 15-point margin over his Republican opponent. He is already hard at work in



Sacramento where the freshman Assembly member was selected as Chair of the Committee on Human Services and he introduced his first bill AB 11, which aims to find solutions to the high cost of living in California and his upcoming legislation package that is planned to address mental health and systemic racism.

Assemblyman Jackson recently told the Press-Enterprise, "Whenever you're the first in anything people didn't think it would be possible. And so hopefully this breaks down people's thoughts about what's possible for them. Being a part of the LGBTQ community in some places, being African American, would be a hindrance for you to win these offices," Jackson said. "As a matter of fact, you could have had to hide pieces of yourself if you were identified with these communities. And so what I think is that the Inland Empire is a new place of opportunity, It's a new place of inclusion."

The 40-year-old Democrat was elected to the Riverside County Board of Education in 2020 and he was founder and Chief Executive Officer of SBX Youth and Family Services, whose mission is to break the cycle of poverty and violence through mentoring education, and community organizing. He continues to serve as the Political Action Chair of the Riverside NAACP and as Youth Minister at the Moreno Valley Church of Christ. He is a graduate of CSU San Bernardino where he received a degree in political science and a graduate of California Baptist University where he received his Master of Social Work degree.
