February Membership Meeting

At the February meeting we had two special invited guest speakers **Jarvis Williams** and **Dr. Phyllis Richie**.

Dr. Ritchie joined us virtually and made a presentation on significant disparities in HIV/STD and PrEP use for Black gay men and spoke of her free sexual health services in Palm Springs. More information is

Jarvis is looking for support for their Historic Black Colleges and University (HBCU) Tour for eligible Black students in the Coachella Valley wide school districts. The program and tour are funded by Palm Springs Unified School District but students need some fiscal support to be able to comfortably go on the tour. Members present at our meeting seemed interested to support this and Brothers of the Desert is giving a donation of \$1,000 to this effort.

You all are encouraged to donate individually if you are interested and note you are a member of Brothers of the Desert. Jarvis is able to give a letter of donation to individuals, if needed. We hope to match the \$1,000 contribution with the help of our group. The tour is April 1-7and

Black History Parade and Black LGBT Meet-up Feb 26

Once again the Brothers of the Desert had a contingent in the Black History Month parade. It was a smaller group of about ten BOD members and allies behind the banner this year, due to a weather-

related date change. The crowds were large and enthusiastic. Unfortunately, the parade was at the same time as the Black LGBT Meetup brunch at the 849 Restaurant. Two dozen Black LGBT community members from BOD and the Women's Circle came together for some personal reflections on what Black History Month means for our community. Author and diversity consultant Lauren Joichin Niles co-hosted the event with BOD President Tim Vincent. She did a brilliant assessment of the "good and the bad" of Black progress in this country. Community members were invited to take the mic to share poetry, song and personal reflections, including Lorenzo Taylor, Anye Elite and Wes Rankin. The showstopper was an acapella rendition of the Negro spiritual "Hush" by BOD member and lyric tenor Richard Riley. Some members did double duty and attended both events. Wes and David even did a costume change between the parade and brunch, looking radiant in their Africaninspired couture.

Grandparents Love Supports Locals Raising Their Grandkids



Many of us in the Black community have first hand experience with being raised by grandparents. Grandparents Love (GPL) is a Coachella Valley nonprofit 501(c)3 created in 2022 to support and assist grandparents who are raising their grandkids. The mission of GPL is to provide the basic resources and support that custodial grandparents so desperately need when taking on the responsibility of bringing up their grandchildren. Often grandparents take custody and raise grandchildren because parents are either deceased or unable to provide care, due

to drugs, incarceration or other reasons. In the Coachella Valley almost 1,800 children age 17 and under are living with their grandparents. Raising kids all over again is a huge undertaking for anyone, especially when you're older and not in the best of health.

Aristotle McDaniel started GPL in memory of his grandparents Jim and Marie McDaniel as a way to support and assist grandparents like his who go above and beyond for their grandkids. Donations are used to help with bills, car repairs, food, clothing, and other necessities to relieve the burden suddenly put on the grandparent guardians. They also provide "respite" experiences like movies or dining out. Although not exclusively serving the Black community, the GPL officers and board members are predominantly African American men.

Dear White People: Please Don't Do This!




In her thought-provoking remarks during the Black LGBT Meet-up, author, keynote speaker, trainer and licensed attorney **Lauren Joichin Niles** struck a nerve and got a heartfelt "amen" from the audience when she mentioned her top racial pet peeve about living in Palm Springs. Like many of us, Lauren grew up in the segregated South and there is an annoying habit that many White people who are not from the South tend to have. Many feel that they


need to preface their introduction to a Black person by letting them know that they know someone Black or have a special appreciation for Black culture. Stop this! she says. "it's one of the most prevalent "daily indignities" that I hear African Americans complain about." Trying to validate yourself in this way supports the myth that proximity to blackness immunized white people from doing racist things. It also makes us feel that you are only interested in knowing us because of our race. Think about it. Black people would never introduce themselves by saying that they have White friends or that they really like Frank Sinatra music. If you want to be a friend, focus on the things we have in common. It's a subtle form of micro aggression to assume that Black people will only accept you if you have Black friends.

BOD member **Wes Rankin** shared another racial pet peeve based on his experiences in Palm Springs. It's the discomfort that he senses from white people when a group of predominantly Black people enter in a public space like a restaurant - the head turning and disapproving stares. It's that same feeling that many of us had in school when we sat with other Black kids, an unfounded fear that we are separatists or too loud or not fitting in. In a place where there are few Black people there is safety and comfort in being with others who share a common history and heritage. Many of us work and live in integrated or predominantly white circumstances where we are constantly codeswitching in order to fit in. Some of us bear the scars of being legally barred from patronizing "White businesses." The next time you see a Black group sitting together <u>SMILE</u> and think about 1) why are all the White people sitting together and 2) how would you want to be received coming into a predominately Black space.
