New African American Art Exhibits in Riverside

Just an hour's drive from Palm Springs you will find the Riverside Art Museum, which is featuring "Sacred



Spaces" an amazing exhibit of **Charles Bibb's** works and his personal art collection. There are about 100 paintings and sculptures on display, including three African-inspired quilts that are part of his personal collection. The world-renown Bibbs is a Riverside native and community activist in the process of creating an African American cultural center for his community. His

works and collection cover three galleries and the colors are brilliant and evocative. The etched figures often have oversized hands and prominent African features. Many are portraits, including a series of work on homeless men (the Bagmen), a series honoring Black women, and another on civil rights movement. The exhibit runs through March 10, 2024. Another RAM gallery features the graphic work of **Rico Gaston** entitled "Icons" where he centers lines of color onto portraits of a dozen Black legends, including Obama, Audrey Lourde and Richard Pryor. Your RAM admission includes the Cheech Museum of Chicano Art and Culture. His eclectic collection of paintings, photography and videos on all aspects of Mexican American life fills a second building.

"TRUTH BE TOLD" FILM ON BLACK GAYS AND THE CHURCH



Among the hundreds of movies and documentaries to be screened at the ten-day Palm Springs International Film Festival, the one that you don't want to miss is "Truth Be Told" by director **Nneka Onuorah**. As the program describes it, "This deeply emotional and probing documentary looks at the troubled relationship between the Black church and its LGBTQ+ members."

It features **Billy Porter**, **Cedric the Entertainer** and the rousing lesbian **Pastor Pam**, who shows the way toward healing. This documentary screens on Tuesday, January 9 and Wednesday, January 10. There will be a screening of the motion picture "Rustin" on Friday, January 5 at the Mary Pickford Theater, with a live appearance by lead actor **Colman Domingo**. Other films that may be of interest include a screening of the 1990s gay epic "Paris is Burning," "The Color Purple," and a bio-pic about a gay icon and legendary disco diva "Gloria Gaynor: I Will Survive." Actresses **Danielle Brooks**, **Taraji P. Henson**, and Director **Blitz Bazawule** will appear live at the January 4 "Color Purple" screening.BOD member **Johnnie McKinley** reminded us that "Studio One Forever" a documentary


Perry Lang Speaks on Sexuality and Religion

The panel included **Rev. Shezarone Carter**, Pastor of Ajalon Baptist Church, Rabbi **Sally Olins**, and **Rev. Eunice Chaffant** moderator of the Center for Spiritual Living, and **James J. Mellon** of the Global Trust Center. There were about forty people in attendance at Mizell Center as part of their Third Wednesday Speaker discussion series organized by BOD member **Ector Simpson**. Perry did a wonderful job of keeping the discussion on track and providing space for the audience to share their experiences (positive and negative) with religious institutions.

Honoring Our Ancestors



Sylvester James Jr. (1947-1988) Perhaps the most widely recognized Black gay entertainer in the world, Sylvester was flamboyant and androgynous way before it was popular (or safe) to do so. His 1978 hit "You Make Me Feel Mighty Real" is universally recognized as one of the major hits of the disco era and we are still proclaiming it in song forty five years later. Sylvester was born in Watts and raised in a middle-class, religious family. Homophobia chased him out of Pentecostal church and he moved to San

Francisco, where he flourished as a cross-dressing performer and recording artist. Sylvester was also an activist who campaigned against the spread of HIV/AIDS and in his final years, he insisted on the inclusion of HIV positive people in the San Francisco

Gay Pride parade. He died from complications arising from the virus in 1988 and left his future royalties to AIDS charities. He blazed a trail for acceptance and creativity and his legend and his music will live on forever.
